

Children must sign the "Golden Book" at the back of church.


"Those whose names are written in the book of life." Phil 4:3.

REFRESHMENTS AFTER MASS. All are welcome to come in for a cup of tea or coffee after Mass.



This has been discussed in the Parish Pastoral Council, so we will continue with the present arrangement, as it seems to be working well.

The Octavius Singers will give us a splendid introduction to Christmas with Carols, popular Christmas songs, Classics and Readings. It is a concert rather than a service to enable you to invite along people of all faiths and none. It was lovely last year and this year promises to be even better, with great effort going into it's preparation. The Octavius Singers give their time and talent for free and usually perform religious works, particularly in their original religious context. For example, singing settings of the Mass during the celebration of Catholic Mass or Evensong in Anglican churches.

Performed under the auspices of the Order of St Lazarus, raising funds for charity. In recent years the Order has supported a variety of causes, including those affected by Hanson's disease (leprosy) in Sri Lanka. They do this through a local charity (SUROL) with it's patron, the Archbishop of Colombo, Cardinal Malcolm Ranjith. SUROL stands for the "Society for the Upliftment and Rehabilitation of Leprosy Affected Persons" and was founded in 1971 by Fr. Realino Chiriatti. SUROL's purpose is mainly to rehabilitate those affected and disabled by leprosy, help their return to communities and rebuild their lives with dignity and self-respect. The founding members adopted a non-religious, non-sectarian and non-partisan strategy for the Society which opened doors for everyone. Public education to remove the stigma attached to leprosy was one arm of SUROL's two-way plan, the other being the important task of rehabilitation of disabled leprosy affected persons.

There is no charge for entry or the reception afterwards but a collection will be taken up in church. We are blessed that we have raised many thousands of pounds for this charity over the years.

FEAST OF ST CATHERINE LABOURÉ. St Catherine's Feastday was on Friday. There are some prayer cards & information sheets at the back of church. There are also Miraculous Medals always available in the sacristy. There are blessed individually. If you ever want one, please come to the sacristy before or after Mass. The Medal has always had the reputation as a powerful means of prayer—hence it became known as "Miraculous". Only months into her novitiate, Catherine experienced extraordinary visions of Our Lady. In 1830, the Blessed Virgin Mary appeared to St. Catherine in the convent chapel. Sitting in a chair with St. Catherine kneeling beside her, the Blessed Virgin told St. Catherine that God wished to entrust her with a mission. Later that same year, Mary appeared again, standing on a globe. Rays of light streamed from her hands. Around her were the words: "O Mary, conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee." Our Lady instructed St. Catherine to have a medal struck with this image.





JOIN OUR PARISH 100 CLUB

For many years St Catherine's Church has run a 100 Club to assist with parish funds. It seems sensible to keep this going under our new circumstances.

There are, in fact, several free numbers for new people to be able to join. In fact, if we can get enough people to sign up, it could be extended in scope to become larger.

It's a very simple idea. Of the money that comes in each week, half goes out as a prize and half goes to the parish. Considering that thee are 52 weeks in the year, you have a good chance of winning sometime in that year!

Pay £1 each week with a chance to win £50 each week. This can be set up by direct debit or paid by cheque - monthly, quarterly or annually. It is hoped that we can move the payments to be done though the bank for the most part, to avoid the need for physical collection.

FOCUS ON PERSECUTED CHRISTIANS: PAKISTAN. Christians in Pakistan are considered second-class citizens and face discrimination in every aspect of life. Occupations that are deemed low, dirty and degrading—such as working as a sewer cleaner or in a brick kiln—are reserved for Christians. Many are referred to as chura, a derogatory term meaning "filthy." "We are a lower class because we are Christians," says one of the 600,000 Pakistani women working in factories. "It is an insult to Muslims to eat with us off the same plate. If we touch their plate, it becomes defiled. We have no right to any privileges, and have no right to dignity. When I had my son, I was put on a dirty bed that still had blood from the woman who had given birth before me. Other women were given a clean bed, but for me, the Isai (the Urdu word for "Christian"), there was only the option of a dirty one." The August 2023 devastating mob violence against the Christian community in the city of Jaranwala was a sobering reminder of the hostile environment facing many believers in Pakistan. The attack on more than 20 churches and almost 100 homes came in response to allegations that two believers had desecrated the Quran—another distorted use of Pakistan's notorious blasphemy laws. The

laws are often used to target minority groups, but Christians are disproportionately affected. Roughly a quarter of all blasphemy accusations target Christians, who only make up 1.8% of the population.

Pray that Pakistan's blasphemy laws will be changed so that Christians will be safe from false accusations and pray for strength for Christians who must live as second-class citizens every day.
