Today's Psalm Psalm 71 All nations shall fall prostrate before you, O Lord.

Epiphany means the revelation of Jesus to the world. The responsorial psalm is a prayer that a new king might bring true justice to the people. In his days justice shall flourish and peace till the moon fails.

The psalmist predicts that foreign kings would come to pay respect to this good king. The Great River is the Euphrates on the eastern border while Tharshish and the sea coasts are to the west. Sheba and Seba represent the south. The Queen of Sheba travelled with gifts of gold and incense in recognition of the wisdom of King Solomon. There was a tradition that her journey was guided by a star. Matthew takes this story as a template for the journey of the wise men from the East who were led by a star to bear gifts of gold, incense and myrrh, in tribute to the new born king. The Magi represent the coming of the nations to fall prostrate before Jesus. The child of Mary belongs to the whole world. Before him all kings shall fall prostrate, all nations shall serve him.

Perhaps it's a good thing the three wise men arrived late at the stable. Had they arrived on time, Christmas would have been over on Boxing Day and we would already have bagged Christmas up and shipped it back up to the attic. Christmas would have been over for another year. We might be guilty of heaving a heartfelt 'glad-Christmas-is-over' kind of sigh, but are we really glad Christmas is over, or are we just glad that the rush and hassle and tatty tinsel have passed? The post-Christmas mood of the magi and the star is somehow all the more significant because we have stopped tearing around in circles and can enjoy Christmas from the perspective of the three wise men.

In Biblical days astrologers believed that strange planetary movement was a sign of a noble birth. It's interesting that when they arrived at the stable with their rich gifts they didn't scratch their heads in puzzlement and decide they'd arrived in the wrong place. Instead they appreciated the significance of Jesus' birth despite the unlikely circumstances. They trusted that their God given star had led them to the right place. We don't hear of the three wise men again, but we imagine the star has led them to greater meaning and fulfilment. Instinctively they knew the road back to Herod and everything he represented was the wrong decision.

We too search for meaning and fulfilment, but all too often we lose our way. God has given us each a star to follow. Deep down we know who we are and what we are about, but all too often we forget to follow our star. Herod comes to push us off course with many distractions. Instead of being true to ourselves we choose jobs dictated by society, we struggle to fit into roles carved out by others. We become obsessed by the need to make money or by some desperate need to be approved of.

The Epiphany is the time to renew our vision. What is our quest? What is it we are looking for, and what obstacles do we need to overcome? How will we recognise Christ in our lives and most importantly, how do we avoid the road back toe Herod?
